New Term - New Building at The Wellington Academy

First day in the new Academy building for Year 7 pupils, Tonicea Bennett, Head Girl, Callum Cook, Head Boy and Jac Cude, Deputy Head Boy

"Back to school" after Easter for pupils and staff at The Wellington Academy was their first day in their stunning new building. Open space and light dominate the heart of this new school : a unique 21st-century building with the feel of a university, equipped with the latest technology and first-class study facilities. It is, quite literally, 'breath-taking'.

Named after its sponsor, Wellington College, the Academy is part of a £32 million government-funded campus, which will be fully completed by the end of the year and will serve as a learning hub for the whole community. Facilities include a 300-seat theatre, extensive sports facilities, superb V1th Form accommodation, as well as a new CCF with an indoor shooting range. There will also be twin bearding houses for 100 children.

"It has been a very special day, watching the children arrive in this new building which has been specially built for them", Principal, Andy Schofield, told Drumbeat. "Since opening in September 2009, Wellington Academy has become one of Wiltshire's highest performing schools and has been rated by Ofsted as having made outstanding progress. "One measure of what was achieved in the first year is that 98% of the Academy's year 11 students achieved the equivalent of 5 or more GCSE passes, compared with 43% in the last year of the predecessor school.

"To walk into our stunning and unique school is truly inspiring. It really is something the community can all be very proud of. I have no doubt the building itself will raise our student and staff aspirations still further !"

Later that day, Governors and Staff from The Wellington Academy were joined by the Master and Staff from Wellington College, in the theatre of the new Academy, for a real 'family' celebration. Also present was Lord Adonis, architect of the Academies programme. He spoke highly of the partnership between the College and the Academy, saying "Governments can sign cheques but everyone else has made this work".

Lord Adonis returned to the Academy a couple of weeks later to take part in a conference on the subject of 'Academies - Making Partnerships work', which was also attended by the Rt Hon Michael Gove MP, Secretary of State for Education, and representatives from the education, construction, and financial sectors.

A Farewell to Alex Bostock

One of Tidworth's best known figures, Alex Bostock, the Head Teacher of Clarendon Junior School, will be retiring at the end of the Summer term.



Alex has been teaching for 41 years, first in the Midlands, then at Clive School in Osnabruck, moving to Clarendon Junior School in January 1990 where his predecessor, the previous Head, John Rainer, had been with the school for 28 years.

During the 21 years Alex has been at Clarendon Juniors, the school has grown in

size from 182 to 316 pupils. New classrooms have been built and two of the biggest achievements have been getting dedicated rooms for a library and for a computer suite. Sport is another area where the school has done well, with its extensive grounds contributing to the School's success in numerous tournaments.

With around 50% of pupils coming from military families, Clarendon School has enjoyed close links with the Garrison.

"I would like to thank all those who have helped the school while I have been Head : Garrison Commanders, Commanding Officers and Welfare Officers. Everyone has been supportive and friendly", Alex told Drumbeat. "And we have always enjoyed the Lucknow band - either here at the school or at the Garrison Theatre. It has been a wonderful way to enthuse the children about music.

"But most of all, my greatest thanks must go to the teachers at the school. They are a dedicated group of professionals; some have worked here for a while and others are parents themselves. Their understanding of the Army has been a great strength for the school".

Alex's expertise has not been limited to Clarendon Junior School. His extensive knowledge in his field has been invaluable to the Tidworth Community Area Partnership, (TCAP), while at the same time enabling the school to be aware of local developments and to contribute to them in Committees and main Board; good cooperation between TCAP and the local Area Board has been vital when planning for the future - "The Community Area Plan in action!" laughed Alex.

Alex's community spirit is unquestionable. After the demise of TDT, it was he who took on the job of organising the Community Awards ceremony, introducing musical entertainment to the evening, performed by the combined choirs from Clarendon and Zouch Primary Schools.

We all wish Alex well in his retirement - and dare to hope that the Tidworth community will play a small part in his plans for the future !

News from 4 RIFLES in Kenya

4 RIFLES is currently in Kenya undergoing intensive training before becoming the British Army's next Spearhead Lead Element - a rapid response force ready to tackle any world-wide crisis at 24 hours' notice. This could range from a major domestic terrorist attack to the evacuation of British nationals overseas.

Around 700 Riflemen have been joined by other units, including artillery and engineers, for a five-week exercise at the British Army Training Unit Kenya, (BATUK).

The aim is to train in the skills of infantry soldiering, including day and night patrolling, ambushing an opposing force and taking control of an area and reassuring the local inhabitants they are safe.

The beautiful scenery and striking red soil of Kenya offer 4 RIFLES a number of challenges which the Salisbury Plain Training Area cannot provide : Roads which are no more than desert tracks put a lot of demands on vehicles, as well as their drivers and mechanics; becoming acclimatised to temperatures of up to 40 degrees Celsius can be another hazard to be overcome - not to mention the African wildlife, such as lions, elephants and zebras !

4 RIFLES continues training in Kenya until the middle of June when the exercise culminates in a major scenario to test them thoroughly before they take up their new role as the British Army's Spearhead Lead Element in October.



Final Squadron returns home



The final Squadron from 2 RTR returned to Tidworth last month after a successful six-month tour of Afghanistan. Soldiers from 'BADGER' have been using the Army's newest armoured fighting vehicles, Warthogs, which have given them firepower, manoeuvrability, and excellent protection.

"I am extremely proud of how the soldiers have fought over the past six months," said Major James Cameron, OC BADGER Warthog Group. "We are looking forward to being back as part of the 2RTR family again. ... We are immensely grateful for the patience and support of all those at home who have kept us going through our time in Helmand."

Tedworth House : "It's about the Blokes ..."

Tedworth House, the iconic Grade 2 listed building on the edge of Tidworth will soon be blazing a trail as a shining example of how wounded, sick and injured soldiers are being cared for. The plans for the house's future as a Recovery Centre were unveiled last month by representatives from the Army and from the charity, "Help for Heroes", at a presentation held in the theatre of the new Wellington Academy.

Brigadier Stephen Hodder, Commander 43 (Wessex) Brigade and Lt Col Simon Hammond, CO of the Personnel Recovery Unit, described the Army Recovery Capability launched in February last year, a partnership between the MoD, the Royal British Legion and Help for Heroes, to ensure that every wounded, sick or injured soldier gets the help that he or she needs to move on to the next stage of their lives. For some this will be a return to Army duty, but for many it will mean a transition into civilian life.

Tedworth House will become a 'Personnel Recovery and Assessment Centre', where MOD staff will assess each person and develop an individually-tailored recovery plan for them. The aim is to equip each one with the life skills and support they will need for the future.

A tremendous amount of building work has been necessary to equip Tedworth House for its new role and this work, undertaken at great speed by contractors, Da Vinci, has been funded by Help for Heroes.

"The house has been left for quite a long time without much attention and we have brought it back to its former glory", said Emma Parry, Co-Founder of the charity. "It's been like bringing an old lady back to life! Those guys and girls have been through hell and we want to give them somewhere where they can spend as long as they like to get where they need to be".

The transformation of the house will be completed in stages, with the first soldiers due to move into temporary accommodation, erected on the site of the old tennis courts, in a few weeks' time.

The facilities to be installed in the house are second to none, including: a cardio-vascular gym, an IT suite, classrooms, a games area, a café/bar in the restored Orangery, a cinema and a self-help kitchen and utility room where residents can prepare snacks and do their own laundry. There will also be a formal garden, a BBQ area and an appropriately-named 'Café Hero'. An additional wing will be built, designed by the foremost classical architects, Quinlan Terry, and the old indoor tennis court will become the 'Phoenix Centre', housing challenging adaptive sports, including the first ever indoor "ski-plex". There will also be family rooms for relatives to come and stay from time to time.

The "Team Tedworth" Mission Statement :

"To inspire our wounded, injured and sick and returning veterans to lead active, independent and fulfilling lives that enables them to reach their full potential and to support them and their families, when needed, for life"

And when the renovations are completed, a finishing touch will be a specially-commissioned statue at the front of the house, representing the Help for Heroes Stretcher Bearers.



"A soldier coming here will become a lifelong member of our 'Band of Brothers' Club", Bryn Parry, Co-Founder and CEO of the charity, told Drumbeat. "After leaving the Army, he can come back here as often as he wants to, to use the gym facilities, or just to 'stay in touch'. And if things start going wrong for him, he can come back here and get help from the 'one-stop welfare shop' where there will be representatives from all the military charities and the local Council. What we are creating here is a huge project. **It will be a launchpad for life - and give a lifetime of support.** We are hoping that people will be doing a lot of fundraising to support us."

Bryn Parry went on to introduce the man who will head the Help for Heroes team in Tedworth House. Having been injured in Afghanistan in 2008, Colonel David Richmond has first hand experience of what the wounded soldiers will be going through.



"I have spent 3 years sharing a rehabilitation programme with them; it's a long old haul and I think experience of that will help", he told Drumbeat. "Tedworth House is going to be a very special place. It is the first Centre designed to take the wounded, injured and sick, many of them very severely wounded, and equip them with all that they need by way of skills, understanding, support and opportunities to go off and fulfil their potential. Everyone who is part of "Team Tedworth" will understand what we are trying to achieve. Not just the people who work in the building, but the whole community.

"There won't be a unit on the Plain or in the Garrison who hasn't had somebody or several people who have served on operations and have been hurt - many severely, or even killed, so people today in the Army know what this means. We live with the aftermath. It's a very real thing. And having Tedworth House at the heart of the military community - well, what better place."

With the annual cost of running the Tedworth House Recovery and Assessment Centre estimated to be in the region of £1.5 million each year, fundraising efforts will continue to be vital.

"I urge people to do more than just give us their passive support", David Richmond concluded. "My plea to this Garrison, and more widely, is : don't take your foot off the fundraising gas yet - there is a long way to go!"
