Facelift for the Bulford Kiwi !



The Bulford Kiwi is being cleaned up by a team of volunteers drawn from Garrison units, Defence Estates and the local Scouts.

Grass, weeds and the layer of grey gravel covering it will be removed, exposing the white chalk below. The work will be completed by Landmarc and then enclosed by a new rabbit-proof fence.

"The Kiwi was the handiwork of the New Zealand Army and was cut in 1919 to commemorate their presence at the nearby, but now long gone, Sling Camp in Bulford, where they had been based since 1916", said Defence Estates Archaeologist, Richard Osgood (oval picture). The best place to see the Kiwi Monument is from about a mile away.

The Kiwi was covered over during the Second World War to prevent it being used as a landmark by the German Luftwaffe and uncovered in 1948 by the 1st Bulford (Kiwi) Scouts. It is also the focus of the "Kiwi Trophy", a gruelling annual march and shoot competition held by the Signal Regiment in Bulford, with the winners usually being presented with trophies by the New Zealand High Commissioner.

The upkeep of the Kiwi has been handled by various groups over the years, including the Kiwi Boot Polish company and the Bulford Signal Regiment; this duty of care has now passed to Defence Estates.

KRH in the Desert

C Sqn Kings Royal Hussars is deployed in the desert of Maysaan Province. Life is pretty tough but some good work is being done, in conjunction with both American and Iraqi forces, to prevent the flow of weapons from Iran into Iraq.



1 Mechanized Brigade takes Command in Basra



1 Mech Brigade formally took charge of operations in southern Iraq from 19 Light Brigade on 1st June, the handover being marked in traditional fashion by a handshake between the outgoing and incoming Commanders.

Brigadier James Bashall, Commander 1 Mech Brigade, later held a joint Press conference with Brigadier Akeel of the Iraqi Army 10th Division, to publicise the change of authority.



With the transition of authority to Provincial Iraqi control set for later this year, Brigadier Bashall's aim was to reassure the Iraqi people that there would be no let up in operations against the terrorists and criminals who continue to pose a threat to the people of Basra and its surrounding area. He went on to say that the training and support of the Iraqi Security Forces was his top priority and that he will do everything he can in order to assist them.

1RHA finds significant weapons cache in Iraq

One week after arriving in Basra, during one of their first routine patrols, troops from 1RHA have scored a significant success against rogue militias in Safwan, 50 km south of Basra, by discovering an underground storage facility with concrete walls around it, used to store a variety of explosives and other items.



The find consisted of 10,000 rounds of ammunition, 6 complete improvised explosive devices, (3 of which were the Explosive Formed Projectiles used to disable armoured vehicles), night vision goggles, rifle sights & other equipment, all of which were in pristine condition.

"It's been a hard first week out here but it was good to give some back to the enemy", said L/Bdr Daniel Viney, who made the initial discovery.



News from Afghanistan ...

In the middle of a major operation to clear the Sanguin Valley of Taliban fighters, soldiers from



1Bn Royal Anglian Regiment and 26 Engineer Regiment have found themselves digging irrigation ditches to prevent crops from drying up and dying in the fields.



Afghan farmers had been trying to complete their task under a hail of bullets and bombs caused by the fighting between Taliban fighters and the Afghan Security Forces supported by the UK-led Task Force Helmand - an operation codenamed 'Op Lastay Kulang', from the Pashto word for 'Pickaxe Handle'.

With Taliban fighters fleeing from the advancing ISAF troops, the situation was deemed safe enough to bring up the heavy machinery of the Royal Engineers. Using the British Army mechanical digger meant that the ditch was completed in hours, rather than the days it would have taken the villagers, using only their hand tools.

The new irrigation ditch will bring an improved water supply to 24 sq km of land used by about 5000 families to grow crops, which would otherwise have failed in the next 10-14 days had the ditch not been completed in time.

Operation Pickaxe Handle is being conducted at the request of the Afghan Government and it is steadily building on the achievements of other recent operations in Northern Helmand. With Taliban fighters gone from much of the Province, British Forces have begun the task of assisting the Afghan Government in reconstruction and development programmes allowing Afghans to return to their villages and farmlands to begin new lives.

Land mines have been used indiscriminately in Afghanistan since the arrival of Soviet forces in 1979 and are still used by the Taliban against British, ISAF and Afghan Forces. As a result, hundreds of thousands of mines lie unmapped and undiscovered in large areas of the country, making Afghanistan the most mined country in the world.

Eliminating the threat of land mines is essential to the revival of the Afghan economy and to assure the well-being of men who support their families by toiling in the mined areas.

A Land Mine Awareness Programme has been launched by British Forces, led by 26 Engineer Regiment. The first ever 'Mine Awareness Day' to be held in Helmand Province took place in the town of Gereshk, with around 250 local children and their families attending. Having



been trained by the Royal Engineers, soldiers from the Afghan National Army showed the children the types of mines that litter the country and how to mark and report them so that they can be destroyed without causing harm.

Farewell

Colleagues and friends, (including a former CO he had not seen for 25 years!), gathered at Tidworth House last month to wish Maj (Retd) Max Wilkinson a happy retirement.

Max began his Army career in the Royal Engineers (V), commissioning into the RAEC in the 1960s. He has worked in the field of Resettlement in Tidworth, both as a Serving and as a Retired Officer, since 1989. A generation of soldiers retiring from or leaving the Army have benefited from Max's excellent and wide-ranging advice, delivered in his own practical and humorous style. He is universally respected by his colleagues for his long experience and deep knowledge of the Resettlement world and for championing the cause of soldiers.

"The 10 years I have spent in Tidworth have been the happiest in my career", he said and plans to make the most of his retirement to spend time on his favourite steam railway hobby. He is pictured here with his successor, Maj (Retd) Rob Howells.



Tidworth here we come !

The 2nd Royal Tank Regiment has been based in Bad Fallingbommel, northern Germany, for the past 15 years and many thought we would never leave. However, the time is fast approaching when the Second will move from Germany to Tidworth. The new barracks is well under way and the handover to the Quartermaster, Captain Dick Fisher, is set for the middle of July. Many families from the Regiment have already moved across and are being well looked after by the QM, the AQMS, WO2 Jones, and a small administrative party from the Regiment. Other Regiments and Battalions in Tidworth and Bulford are also being hugely supportive. The Regiment is currently spread to the four winds with BADGER and CYCLOPS in Iraq with 1 Mechanised Brigade, FALCON in Afghanistan with 12 Mechanised Brigade and EGYPT have just returned from Iraq. Having been in Germany for so long the move will no doubt be a culture shock to many with the loss of Living Overseas Allowance, tax free cars, cigarettes and alcohol. However, everyone is keen to get to Tidworth and be at the heart of life in 1 Mechanised Brigade and Tidworth, Netheravon & Bulford Garrison.

The Second last moved to Tidworth in 1964 and no doubt being in Tidworth will provide many excellent opportunities - particularly training on Salisbury Plain. Tidworth is also in the middle of the recruiting area for the Second and it will be very much like returning home.



Charity Auction Success

A Charity Dinner Night and Auction organised by the local SSAFA team took place in Bulford last month, raising nearly £18,000 for the charity.

The auction prizes on offer included items normally not available to the public, such as : a day with the Household Cavalry Mounted Regiment; a day with the Royal Engineers; a day of live firing with the Royal Artillery and, one of the most sought after, a dinner party prepared by Military Chefs from the Royal Logistic Corps. A number of quite serious bidding wars contributed towards the size of the total amount raised, which will be used to help needy causes in the local area.



Maysaan Patrol ...

Cpl Polly Cairns and I flew from Basra on the 31 May to take part in border patrols conducted by the KRH Battle Group within the Maysaan province. We were to be embedded within the call-signs as subject matter experts advising on search and detention procedures.



We arrived in Maysaan and were introduced to the Kings Royal Hussars Operations Officer. We were given a quick brief as to what was going to happen over the next six days and then we had some down time to sort out our kit.

We stayed in the 'Forward Operating Base' over night and after a good night's sleep we were off again this time to meet A Squadron, Household Cavalry Regiment, which was the squadron we were going to be attached to. We met the A Squadron Operations Officer who issued us with our own Land Rover. I was very impressed by this as I thought I would be squashed into the back of a Spartan or other equally small armoured vehicle. We spent the next few hours meeting and greeting some of the key individuals we were going to work with. All seemed really enthusiastic about the task at hand and equally pleased to have us on board. After trying to stay out of the sun for what seemed like an eternity, the air cooled as night finally fell and I began to feel a bit more comfortable.

The next morning we were told that we were moving out. We were moving further north nearer the border into the Area of Operations. The going was bumpy and driving with no lights on using our night vision goggles was interesting to say the least but, after squashing three small bushes and a lizard thing, Cpl Cairns finally got the hang of driving. We drove for about 4 hours to our new location, when we finally stopped and made camp. I was relieved as my neck was aching from supporting my head over the rough terrain. This time it wasn't as chilled out as the first night; we had to sleep in our uniform with our boots on ready to go. I didn't mind this because it meant that if I had my boots on, nothing else could use them as a hiding place.

At sunrise we broke camp and headed out for our first tasking. We were to conduct a number of vehicle check points along a road that crossed the border with Iran. We stayed for about twenty minutes in each location before moving on and spoke to dozens of people, all of whom seemed chatty and pleased to see British Forces. I was amazed at the number of farmers we talked to as we were in the middle of a desert with, as far as I could see, not too many farms about. The heat of the day peaked at around 1300 hrs. I did try and get the temperature from my watch but it had overheated so at a guess I would say it was about 700 degrees centigrade.

We stayed on task moving location for about six hours before we made our way back to our camp as the light began to fade. This time I drove; the less said about that the better. Over the next four days we pretty much repeated our tasking. Each day a little further and a little longer. I felt a little sad to leave and fly back to Basra. I felt myself and Cpl Cairns had made some good friends within the squadron and seen some spectacular scenery, but I was looking forward to getting back and having a shower and sleeping on a bed. Selfish I know - I don't envy the soldiers of the KRH one bit.

Helping to rebuild Basra

There are many different problems that Iraqis face every day : limited access to clean water, a lack of electricity, poor sewage systems and an inadequate schooling structure. Rebuilding local amenities is an important part of what the 4 RIFLES Battle group is trying to do and, although this work has been made increasingly difficult by the current security situation, there are many projects under way, all aimed at re-building the infrastructure of the city and helping the local population recover from years of repression.



When Father Danny Hernandez was on tour in Basra in 2004, he struck up a lasting friendship with a fellow Catholic priest, Father Imad Al Banna. Now back in Iraq with the 4 RIFLES Battle Group, Father Danny has rekindled his friendship with the now Bishop (elect) of Basra and they both have been working hard, alongside the

Civil and Military Co-operation team, (CIMIC), to help communities all over Basra, from all faiths and tribes, who come to the British Forces with projects that they wish to carry out in their local areas, such as :

Kindergarten : a kindergarten in the Al-Tuwaysa district is being rebuilt, with a capacity increased from 130 to 330. Children from all faiths will attend the kindergarten and the new facilities will help their educational development.

Healthcare : Medical services in the city are poor, especially for less fortunate families. Father Imad provides a free clinic at his church in the Mustafha district where the poorest families can come to visit a Doctor and get essential medical supplies. The 4RIFLES Regimental Aid Post has donated some much needed supplies to the church, in order to allow this clinic to provide a better service to the local population.



Areas of particular significance : A cemetery in the Al Amtahiya area which has been constantly flooded for the past few years, will be repaired.

"Most Iraqis are very pleased to see us and keen for us to improve the

security situation", said Recce Platoon Commander, Capt Bertie Basset. "It is good for the Riflemen to experience this as it makes them realise the difference we are making by bringing security and improving living standards".

Cpl Danny "Disco" Ord, said, "The Arabic training we received is really useful and acts as a good conversation starter to get the people on our side".

Overall, patrols such as these are vital to win the battle for hearts and minds in Basra City and to decrease the influence of the militia. This all helps to lay the foundations for the handover of the area of operations to the Iraqi Security Forces, planned for later this year.

Fire Safety Advice for the home ...

Before going to bed or leaving for work in the morning :
